WEBB, 'Chick' William Henry, drums

Born: Baltimore, Maryland, 10th February 1909 Died: Baltimore, Maryland, June 16th, 1939

Overcame physical deformity caused by tuberculosis of the spine. Bought first set of drums from his earnings as a newspaper boy. Joined local boys' band at the age of 11, later (together with John Trueheart) worked in the Jazzola Orchestra, playing mainly on pleasure steamers. Moved to New York (c. 1925), subsequently worked briefly in Edgar Dowell's Orchestra. In 1926 led own five-piece band at the Paddock Bottom Club, New York, for five-month residency. Later led own eight-piece at the Paddock Club before leading own Harlem Stompers at Savoy Ballroom from January 1927. Added three more musicians for stint at Rose Danceland (from December 1927). Worked mainly in New York during the late 1920s - several periods of inactivity - but during 1928 and 1929 played various venues including Strand Roof, Roseland, Cotto Club (July 1929), etc.. During the early 1930s played the Roseland, Savoy Ballroom, and toured with the 'Hot Chocolates' revue. From late 1931 the band began playing long regular seasons at the Savoy Ballroom (later fronted by Bardu Ali). They continued to play theatre dates and tour and also did a season at the Casino de Paris, New York, in 1934 (in late 1932 the band did a series of theatre dates accompanying Louis Armstrong). By the mid-1930s Chick Webb's name was virtually synonymous with the Savoy ballroom, in 1935 he introduced his new vocaliste, Ella Fitzgerald. The band also did far-ranging tours. During the summer of 1938 they broke several all-time attendance records at ballrooms and theatres, by then Chick's health had begun to fail. He left hospital in November 1938 and began a tour of Texas, he was stricken by pleurisy and again entered hospital until January 1939. He continued to appear regularly with the band until shortly before his death, playing his last engagement on a big riverboat sailing out of Washington. He died in the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, shortly after undergoing a major urological operation. The personnel of the band remained together to work for a while under Ella Fitzgerald's leadership. In 1947 a memorial recreation centre, dedicated to the memory of Chick Webb, was opened in Baltimore. Showman Bardu Ali (from Wavesland, Mississippi) was for several years employed by Chick Webb to front the band and ast as master of ceremonies. (J. Chilton, Who's Who of Jazz)

Chick Webb and his Savoy Orchestra were the No. One black dance band in Harlem, New York, until Webb's early death in 1939. The band lived from Chick's immense swing and drive on his drums, and from a very steady personnel of young and ambitioned jazz musicians. In 1935, Ella Fitzgerald was added to the band as their singer. This combination made the Webb band most attractive to the recording industry and internationally known. Their home-base was the Savoy Ballroom at 596, Lenox Avenue, New York, the "Home of Happy Feet".

It must be stated that the Chick Webb Orchestra were a bunch of great jazz players, but the Decca Company "reduced" them to a band mainly to accompany Ella Fitzgerald. Thus, the best of their jazz material may be found on transcriptions and air-checks published on LPs and special CD-labels,

To my utmost regret, there is no test of this recording left for our interest and delight!

Following my remarks about trombone player William Paris in my article on the Original Jazz Hounds (see elsewhere on this website) the personnel for Chick Webb's Harlem Stompers of 25 August 1927 in Rust*6 should certainly be: Bobby Stark – tpt; William R. Paris (recte Wilbur de Paris) – tbn; Johnny Hodges – alt; Elmer Williams – ten; Don Kirkpatrick – pno; Benny James – bjo, gtr; Leon England – bbs; Chick Webb – dms. This is the common dance band instrumentation of the period in Harlem when not augmented for larger premises.

Arrangements were written for this basic personnel with possible parts for additional musicians. A personnel of tpt - 2 altos - ten - rhythm as listed in Rust*6 would have been very un-normal at the time, Frankie Newton used it ten years later, and possibly others, too. No William Paris is mentioned anywhere as altoist, but certainly as trombonist, but should be recognised as Wilbur de Paris.

These unfortunately very short musical examples of an early Chick Webb band accompany a dance-contest in a Harlem night club on film. What this fantastic band might have sounded like if recorded with adequate equipment! First issued by John R.T. Davies on his Ristic label, later also on Harlequin HQ 2038 'Black Bands on Film 1928 - 1935'.

- The 'I Ain't Got Nobody' eight-bars fragment at the beginning certainly has the Webb band playing (and not a studio band as I have found stated somewhere!), with syncopated muted-trumpet by Edwin Swayze. And Chick Webb can clearly be recognised playing press-rolls in ragtime-derived style and a final cymbal stroke to end the number. Another eight-bars fragment of this tune is played at the end of the film, but the drummer is less audible, there. This first fragment of 'I Ain't Got Nobody' then has to be seen as the first documented appearance of Chick Webb playing drums.
- Two of the three 'Sweet Sue' fragments each comprise a three-quarter chorus by the band with dancing by different couples of dancers, the third fragment comprising a whole chorus. The first chorus has a muted-trumpet solo by very probably Ward Pinkett, the second chorus a muted-trombone solo by Bennie Morton, and the third chorus a muted-trumpet solo by Ward Pinkett, again.
- The clarinet solo on the 'Tiger Rag' part is played by Bobby Holmes, who, by the way, is shown with his clarinet at hand in the entire bandpart of the film, his alto lying on the floor besides his feet. In this title he shows a fast multi-toned and straight-ahead clarinet performance with little harmonic and rhythmic finesse, but swinging and giving a lift to the band.
- It is very interesting to note that no written arrangements are used, and the band play entirely ad-lib for the whole duration of the band parts. The saxophones noodle along ad-lib, creating a thick harmonic background, yet un-structured – for the brass soloists. This, I presume, was the usual way Harlem big bands played for dancing when they were assembled lately and for short duration only, and lacked a sufficiently large band-book of arrangements.

This is absolute first-class Harlem big band music. Chick Webb soloing on the Ludwig hand-cymbal. I firmly believe that this is a Benny Carter arrangement. Solos by Horton (or Bennie Morton? see below!), Kirkpatrick, Jefferson, Williams, probably Swayze tpt and Pinkett

Joe Garland's presence is affirmed by Johnny Simmen of Zurich, Switzerland, from Garland's own recollections.

But I found myself unable to decide the identity of the trombonist!

And a first-class big band blues by this early Chick Webb band. Solos by probably Pinkett muted, Jefferson or rather Garland clarinet, Horton muted, probably Swayze. Chick Webb can clearly be heard using his Ludwig hand-cymbal at the very end of this title. He is thus not omitted from proceedings as listed in the discographies.

Joe Garland's presence is affirmed by Johnny Simmen of Zurich, Switzerland, from Garland's own recollections.

And yes, the Mosaic booklet is right in stating that John Trueheart switches to guitar on this side. But who may be the eleventh men participating? A third trumpet would be the first possibility, but the brass section does not sound like it. Nor does the clarinet section sound to have four players. And: arrangements of this time did usually not include parts for third trumpet or fourth saxophone/clarinet! So, I – KBR – would rather see this statement resulting in some negligent observation of a studio assistant.

This is one of the early Chick Webb bands before their long-lasting engagement as house-band at the Savoy Ballroom with its quite steady personnel. The band sounds typically Carterish in playing Benny Carter arrangements. Yet, we do not hear any ad-lib Carter solos on these sides, except for his eleven clarinet notes at the very end of 'Soft And Sweet'. Jimmy Harrison was in a bad state because of his cancer ailment, and he had to live less than four months, only. Yet, he still shines in his un-comparable trombone style.

But the band had a solid trumpet soloist in Louis Bacon, who stayed with Webb until 1934. Don Kirkpatrick and John Trueheart are Webb's life-long friends and stalwarts.

There are two very short spots of a celesta heard in the first title, and two spots of vibraphone heard in the second, the first of these – at the start of the first chorus – might possibly also well be the sound of a tubular-bell. The Mosaic booklet adjoins these sounds to drummer/bandleader Chick Webb. But – regarding the fact that Webb would have to get up from his seat, go to the celesta or the vibraphone and hit some very few notes and then go back – I would like to adjoin these notes to be played by the pianist, who would have been annoyed much less than the drummer. And he knew the notes much better!

This recording session is played by the early Chick Webb band under Armstrong's name, when Louis did not have a band of his own. As almost always in later years, these titles are feature-numbers for Armstrong, and nothing will be said here in praise of Louis as so much has been said before, and certainly more appropriate than I would be able to.

In consequence, there is little solo performance of band members on these sides. But the following should be mentioned:

- 'That's My Home': Louis shares a too-short chase part in the verse with Elmer Williams on tenor. Otherwise, it's Armstrong throughout in this tune, except, perhaps, for two possibly ad-lib bars by probably Louis Bacon on the trumpet.
- 'Hobo, ...': there is beautiful 4/4 tuba by Elmer James all over, a tenor sax chorus by Williams, and a rather modern muted swing/bluesy trombone chorus a bit shaky, perhaps. (Charlie Green had obviously listened to the younger trombonists of his time.)
- 'I Hate To Leave You, Now': Louis Bacon probably plays a nice muted obligate behind Louis' vocal. Then it is all Louis again.
- 'You'll Wish ... Born': obviously is an early setting of his 'You Rascal, You'. There are fine solo outings by Elmer Williams, by Green with a solo in early swing fashion and nice Pete Clark on clarinet.

The pianist is listed as Don Kirkpatrick. (J. Chilton's 'Who's Who of Jazz' says that Kirkpatrick "worked mainly with Chick Webb until late 1932, then long spell with Don Redman from early 1933." When listening to these late 1932 Victor sides it strikes that the pianist here plays very similar to Joe Steele's style (two tags in 'I Hate To Leave You Now' and the piano below the ensemble parts in 'You'll Wish You'd ...') with its filigree harmonics. I therefore have added Steele as possible pianist for these sides instead of Kirkpatrick.

I believe not to have heard Elmer James on string-bass here, but on tuba only throughout this session.

This is the start of the Chick Webb band in their classic and more modern form, only Bobby Stark not yet on his chair. 'Sunny Side Of The Street' shows young Taft Jordan's capability in following Armstrong's way of playing and singing.

The band swings like mad in 'Darktown Strutters Ball', played in a Benny Carter arrangement showing Carter's generous handling of tune structures and chord sequencies. And then there is Sandy Williams' sharp and moderately dirty way of soloing, and a nice chorus of littleknown Reunald Jones. Sadly, Joe Steele's complex piano solo cannot match the given pace of the arrangement, and is even more disturbed by someone's silly tinkling with bells. I have found these bells attributed to bandleader Webb somewhere. And I did not believe. But listening, you may recognise that the drums are silent for the duration of the piano solo, and thus Chick Webb really might have got up from his drum-seat to use the bells – a single one, that is.

As the reader/listener may see in session 008, this 'Darktown Strutters Ball' take -2 seems to be the only one existing (see next session)! But I certainly would like to hear of an explanation different from mine of this problem.

It seems that this take of 'Darktown Strutters Ball' was not reissued up to now, but you may find it on "YouTube". I - KBR - did, with the help of my "good ole" friend Michael Rader. The "YouTube" version does not show a take designation - the matrix number 152659 only but clearly the disc number CB-754. But much to my displeasure, this take seems to be identical to take -2 above. Every anchor-phrase in the instrumental solos are identical, even the tinkling bell sounds during the piano solo with silent drums.

As the matrix number of "this" 'Darktown Strutters Ball' does not belong to the matrix-block of January 15, I assume that there is no take -4, but take -2 only from the December 20 date. Thus, I'd prefer to list it in italics, here.

Take -2 - as we know it - might not have been issued early on, but found in the Columbia vaults by Miss Chmura and issued on CBS CL-2639, and used for CD reissues since then. Strange to say, Rust*2 lists the title as rejected in December 20, while all other Rusts list it as on the Columbia LP CL-2639. Take -4 is listed in all Rusts as on Col CB-754 from January 15, 1934.

The other two tunes are typical Edgar Sampson arrangements, the first title 'If Dreams Come True' a Sampson original that has become famous among jazz musicians in the subsequent years as a session number. In this tune we find an entire chorus of piano soloing by Steele, here in profound Harlem stride-style, yet played in his kind of symphonic manner. Great solos by Edgar Sampson, Sandy Williams and little known Reunald Jones, but no solos by Taft Jordan.

'I Can't Dance' is Philadelphia trumpeter Charlie Gaines' famous party tune, sung by Taft Jordan and a band choir and arranged by Edgar Sampson in his no-nonsense arranging style.

On another level is the somewhat trashy stock arrangement of 'Imagination' with its queer chorus structure, sung in an adequate way by white singer Chuck Roberts, but rescued in some way by Jordan's very jazzy trumpet outings.

I have just recently (10-09-2024) been informed by Phil Melick of Charleston, W.V. that "at least two copies of Col 2920-D were pressed with 152734-1, a quite noticeably different performance of 'Imagination' especially in Jordan's solos." (Unfortunately, I was not able to hear this take and compare.)

The first title – like 'Imagination' of the session before – is part of the sentimental and commercial side of the Webb band. And it is a showcase for Taft Jordan's Armstrong-oriented performance. His final trumpet half-chorus is beautiful but little original. But listen to Joe Steele's piano accompaniment in his very own semi-classical style, which is expertly played and very tasteful and elegant. Steele fills all "empty" spaces of Sampson's arrangements perfectly.

Although listed as a member of the Chick Webb band in all Rusts for this date, Arbello is not present here.

Again, one of Edgar Sampson's unobtrusive but beautiful compositions/arrangements: 'Blue Minor'. Sampson seems not to have liked arranged modulations of keys. He always changes from one key to another without any modulation, the direct way. So, 'Blue Minor' starts in Bb minor, solos are in Db major, and the whole affair ends with a half-chorus in Bb minor, again. There is much space for beautiful improvisation. This tune was also recorded for Decca two months later, on 11 September, 1934. Diversities to this recording (not alternate takes!) may be found in the corresponding 'Tunes Structures' below. John Kirby plays a wonderful legato tuba here in 'True'. In 'If It Ain't Love' it's Webb on his hi-hat cymbal in the beginning, and below singer Linton we hear the very under-rated Joe Steele delivering a nice piano accompaniment.

This is the first recording of the Chick Webb band under the name of 'Chick Webb and his Orchestra', the 'Savoy' addition dropped. There is an entire chorus of piano solo in 'Lona' and an 8-bar solo spot in 'Blue Minor', and both solos are played in a linear style with typical Stride-style embellishments in Joe Steele's "symphonic" style.

And: Claude Jones still is with the Henderson band recordings for Decca until September 25, 1934. So, was he really with the Chick Webb band on this date? All trombone solos on these sides are apparently by Sandy Williams. And again, listen to John Kirby's fantastic bass playing. There are vibraphone sounds at the very end of 'Lona' and might well be by Webb.

And what a jazzy singer and trumpet player Taft Jordan was – very much in Armstrong's style.

Taft Jordan stars on 'It's Over Because We're Through' on trumpet and singing this Willie Bryant tune in his own Armstrong mould. And listen to Joe Steele's fine piano accompaniment to Jordan's vocal. The second tune is one of Edgar Sampson's very famous compositions and performed in his typically simple and unobtrusive arrangement.

And 'Don't Be That Way' carries an eight-bars drum solo by the master in the last chorus, played with brushes in fast triplets.

'What A Shuffle' is a composition – if you like to call it one – and an arrangement by pianist Don Kirkpatrick ... and it really is a shuffle. Seldom did I have such difficulties in analysing an arrangement and distinguish the different parts. (Please, excuse, if I am partly wrong here!) Most interestingly: Kirkpatrick did not leave room for the pianist to solo.

And, at the end of this session another Sampson composition, 'Blue Lou', one of my own very favourite swing-tunes, with an entire pianochorus by Joe Steele - beside his exemplary band accompaniment. Notes:

We have the very young Ella Fitzgerald at age 17 here, at her very first recording session. And what an impact she makes! I have Reunald Jones on trumpet substituting for Bobby Stark for this and the subsequent session in my notes (see Ken Vail's Jazz Itineraries, Vol.2, 'Ella Fitzgerald'). There is no soloing recognisable as by Stark on these sides. Certainly, Fernando Arbello was a reputed musician in Harlem jazz circles, and yet, he can be heard only in 8 bars in 'Love And Kisses' at this session. (Ken Vail's 'Ella Fitzgerald' has no Fernando Arbello anywhere!)

Again, on piano we hear Joe Steele with fast linear runs on these sides, playing beautifully. And it's Wayman Carver on flute in 'Down Home Rag' and 'Are You Here To Stay?'. This is the "commercial" Chick Webb band with little hot soloing. It is reported that Webb wanted his band to sound like the famous white bands!

Bandleader Chick Webb, wanting his band "to sound like the famous white bands", is now on his way to more commercialism. His repertoire will more and more be dominated by arrangements of young white arranger Van Alexander, and by Ella Fitzgerald's fame.

At this session, we still have two arrangements by Edgar Sampson played. And I believe that it's Sampson leading the reed section in 'I'll Chase The Blues Away'.

Thanks to George H. Buck, Jr's immensely fertile efforts to reissue hundreds of performances of the jazz and Swing eras out of the scope of the big record companies, we find these wonderful transcriptions on his Circle label. These transcriptions were not made for commercial sale, but for radio broadcasts. "Due to contractual agreements, the transcriptions credited the artists as Chuck Warner and his Orchestra with vocals by Evelyn Fields and Carl Landon" (Frank Diggs, booklet to Circle CCD 72). According to this same booklet, Taft Jordans presence is doubtful. A possible replacement is named as Wallace Jones of Ellington fame, but lacking any solos nothing substantial can be said. And there is pianist Joe Steele with a whole solo chorus in 'Big John Special'. His style is clearly recognisable.

Arrangers V. Alexander and C. Dixon are designated in the Circle-CD booklet, only. I - KBR - have attributed all other arrangements to Edgar Sampson to the best of my knowledge.

But beware: some of these titles were reissued on German Polydor LP 423248 in early LP times, and the Polydor people have cut out the clarinet solo chorus of 'Keepin' Out Of Mischief Now'. I can only suspect that clarinettist Pete Clark did not play hot enough for their tastes. For me, this is "distortion of history"!

He and Webb had a rare falling out and Jordan joined Willie Bryant's band downtown at Connie's Inn for several weeks. In my opinion (F. Driggs' - KBR), Bobby Stark takes all the trumpet solos on this album, which would not be the case if Jordan were present. The most likely replacement at the time would be Wallace Jones who switched jobs with Jordan when the latter returned to Webb sometime in April or May of 1936.'

From now on, young white Van Alexander is an integral part of the Chick Webb organisation as the chief arranger, relieving Edgar Sampson who left the band to become a free-lance arranger in July 1936 – out of annoyance, perhaps? And the whole affair tends to become less airy and soft, but more academical and strict. And the band loses their original adolescence and chastity. What a pity.

A little special are Chick Webb's two soft drum breaks on the "traps" at the end of the last title, very melodic and with feeling. *Notes:*

James P. Johnson's interesting title 'Go Harlem' carries the charm of Sampson's arrangement, with a couple of very short solo spots embedded, the most beautiful of them being Sandy Williams' "squeezed" trombone break with its upward glissando "rip" of an octave. (Williams certainly is one of the closest heirs of Jimmy Harrison.) And the three minimal drum breaks by Webb – very nice. 'Sing Me A Swing Song' is Ella Fitzgerald's title in the new style and includes a fantastic drum break in Chick Webb manner in sixteenth pace.

There is little room now for hot soloistic by the horn men, but plenty of space for Ella. Instead, the improved recording technique makes us hear very clearly Chick Webb's drumming in bridges and breaks, and his use of the high-hat cymbal in driving the band. To be heard in 'A Little Bit Later On' and in 'Love, You're Just A Laugh'.

Have a look at my 'Solos ad-lib' list below to see what has been lost in soloistic and jazz-wise, compared to the earlier days of the band. And: this is Joe Steele's last recorded session with the Webb band. The more so, it's the last recording session after all of this remarkable and extra-ordinary musical and sensitive pianist.

The band now has gone through a couple of significant changes: Louis Jordan succeeded in Edgar Sampson's chair in summer (July) 1936, pianist Tommy Fulford joined in summer 1936, as did Beverly Peer on string-bass, both of them at the age of 24 years. And tenorist Teddy McRae starts contributing own arrangements. The first title's arrangement may well be his work.

From here on it's the youthful Ella Fitzgerald with Chick Webb and his band in arrangement, "sounding like the famous white bands", with a minimum of hot solos. For me – KBR – a lover of hot jazz music, it is sort of a decline, I am sorry to say.

Chick Webb and his Orchestra are a serious and professional big band now, driven by a fantastic drummer, accompanying Ella Fitzgerald and Charles Linton, but the charm and the looseness have gone. Yes, it's a very good dance and show band, but there is very little jazz only – eight bars of ad-lib trumpet in two titles. And: drummer Webb is fascinating me with his work on the skins when segueing from different parts of the arrangement to the subsequent ones.

Note: The Twinkgost Rogo LP has the Chick Webb titles on the first side, and one side with the 'Ink Spots' titles. 'The Ink Spots' were an entirely male vocal group, while the above 'Have A Good Night, Folks!' features a mixed male/female vocal group, probably simulating a group of Savoy audiences. Tom Lord's discography falsely adjoins these singers to the Ink Spots! Yet, the 'Ink Spots' were a group of the late 1940s!

These titles were recorded as radio transcriptions for Radio WJZ in New York City. And – as to my own knowledge – this seems to be the earliest live recording of the Webb band issued on LP/CD.

After an un-identified choir accompanied by the Webb band rhythm section plus Wayman Carver on baritone sax first and Pete Cark on clarinet second, there is a great and driving 'That's A Plenty' with plenty of room for soloists and Mr. Webb personally on drums. That's the jazz side of the band. 'Vote For Mr. Rhythm' has Ella and Chick, the "King of the Savoy", in exchange of song and drums. Very nice. 'Wanton Rhythm Man' then is a fast but boring accumulation of riffs without one bar only of hot soloistic. And 'Big Boy Blue' has fine vocal all through, but no solos. Anyway, this is the Webb band in a hot and loose form, and nice to listen to and appreciate. *Notes:*

It looks like the Charlie Johnson band was out of action, so that Bobby Johnson, their "eternal" guitarist, switched over to the Chick Webb band for almost two years. John Trueheart, Chick's lifelong friend and co-worker, had to pause because of a serious illness. But he was back in the Webb band in spring 1939.

Of eight titles recorded at this session, six restrict to the vocal – band formula. Only two present the jazz potency of the band: 'Clap Hands, Here Comes Charlie' in a fast Sampson arrangement with some Webb drum-breaks and the reed-soloists as given below. 'That Naughty Waltz' has the melody played by Carver's baritone sax, then a half-chorus by the reeds led by first trumpet. The subsequent clarinet solo decidedly is not by Pete Clark, but – as I assume – by Louis Jordan. And the last chorus juggles with the beat. A very nice arrangement by former Henderson banjoist Charlie Dixon. (J. Chilton in his 'Let The Good Times Roll' has Jordan playing the baritone solos and leaves the clarinet solo un-mentioned.)

The first title is Ella Fitzgerald's performance in her renowned manner, on an arrangement of Van Alexander. It is my suspicion that Alexander was mainly responsible for Ella's tunes with "streamline" - or sterile - swing music, and that Webb bought arrangements for jazz titles from other arrangers. Thus, we have two titles arranged by the former Henderson banjoist Charlie Dixon: 'Squeeze Me' with a short Taft Jordan trumpet solo and Chick's eighth strokes all through, very urgent but yet lazy and swinging. Wonderful! And then the very fast 'Harlem Congo', a composition by early swing trombonist/arranger Harry White of 'Mills Blue Rhythm Band' fame - here arranged by Charlie Dixon again, and carrying hot solos by trumpet, trombone and clarinet, and finally by Chick Webb's drums taking 24 bars. Wow! This title is played with an astounding pace of c. 290 beats per minute.

Although the 'First Time' LP-cover says that these titles were recorded off the air in 1937, there is no definite date mentioned for this broadcast, and I have been unable to extract such from Ken Vail's Jazz Itineraries No. 2, 'Ella Fitzgerald'. Is it, because Ella is not on them? Yet, it might be the second broadcast issued after the one of February 8, 1937 (see session 022 above). When checking 'Ken Vail's Jazz Itineraries Vol. 2' for all the known or documented broadcasted sides and titles, there must be much more of this material in private hands than has been issued in the last decades. And I fear that most of them will disappear in vaults and archives - at the end of the CD era without being made accessible to the public.

This again is the Chick Webb jazz band playing, and there are a lot of fine hot solos around. We here have six wonderful dance band titles by the Webb band preserved on LP.

The band starts with 'Tea For Two' featuring Bobby Stark's typical technical trumpet and Tommy Fulford's piano cum Chick's wood-block. The most interesting title for me is Fletcher Henderson's 'Grand Terrace Rhythm' - developed out of Henderson's earlier 'D Natural Blues' (and it still is played in the very un-common key of D major). Chick Webb is heard playing great drums accompaniment to the band tutti, and at the end we hear tenor sax and baritone sax coupled for un-common sounds of the band, while early on the sax section is led by a clarinet. 'Sugar Foot Stomp' also has great solos and fantastic rhythm by the rhythm section and its drummer. It is Fletcher Henderson's arrangement again. And hear Chick's wood-block behind the piano solos! Turk Van Lake was listed as arranger of 'I Want To Be Happy' in some discographies in the past, but he confirmed that he was not the arranger. The Mosaic CD-booklet lists Van Alexander instead. This may be valid for the big-band-parts of the arrangement, but the fluteclarinet parts in the middle of the number exactly follow the Wayman Carver formula of arranging for the 'Little Chicks'. Thus, I assume that these parts were inserted into the Van Alexander arrangement to pep this number up. This certainly is the explanation for the title issued on a 12" Decca disc. That same feature of Carver's flute-clarinet combination we find in 'Hallelujah!' – also on the 12" issue - causing me to assume both title's arrangements as collaborations of Alexander and Carver.

'The Dipsy Doodle' owns a 44-bar AABA chorus the melody of which is presented by the reed section led by a clarinet, obviously using Glenn Miller's trade-mark.

It looks like there is no hope to find a copy of take -A of 'Midnite In A Madhouse', although the French CD series 'Chronogical Classics' (sic) list it in their CD 517 version of this title. Comparing all issued LP/CD versions result in recognising their identity. But this number – at least – is packed with good and hot jazz solos!

'If Dreams Come True' is Edgar Sampson's composition (what was Benny Goodman's part in it?), but I doubt his authorship of the arrangement, although listed thus in the Mosaic CD-booklet. But I must consider that Sampson is some years behind his early arranging activities and may have developed his style by now. Notes:

From now on, we have a three-part trombone section with George Matthews added. And Alexander's arrangements are sprinkled with threepart trombone sequences from now on.

This session then produced Ella Fitzgerald's composition and all-time hit 'A Tisket A-Tasket' - first in major, then in minor key - which for now is the measure for most of the subsequent recordings of Chick Webb and his Orchestra: Ella plus band - and a very little bit of hot soloing, but excellent performing of the band.

This then is a proper jazz session, inserted into a session of Ella Fitzgerald and her Savoy Eight (a contingent of the Webb orchestra), but the big band shining here. 'Spinnin' The Webb' has a beautiful solo by Webb's longest serving trumpeter Bobby Stark with his intricate style. He shares his chorus with Sandy Williams on trombone. And the drummer uses a large ride cymbal - unchoked - throughout the last chorus. I have never heard that before in a Webb recording! There is a constant "shuffle-rhythm" played by the rhythm section in this title. 'Liza' very probably is not – as often maintained - the arrangement of Benny Carter, but Van Alexander's. But I think to hear some of Carter's arranging characteristics here. It is a phenomenal concertino for jazz drums with orchestra, and it shows the physically disabled drummer/bandleader at the top of his capacities and taste, playing with a band of Harlem's top musicians, using traditional drum technique on the "traps" – utterly thrilling!

Louis Jordan has left the band by now, being replaced by one of the most un-recognised but most emotionally touching musicians of classic jazz, altoist Hilton Jefferson. His solos always seem to be sheer poetry.

We start with a jazz number 'Pack Up Your Sins...' with vocal by Ella and a fabulous and lovely solo by Hilton Jefferson on alto sax. He is followed by the earlier newcomer in the trombone section, George Matthews.

A little Scottish flavour brings us 'McPherson Is Rehearsin' with Ella singing. No hot solos here. 'Everybody Step' has Ella singing and probably Bobby Stark playing the melody – or is it Mario Bauza? And 'Ella' is not a feature number for Ella, but Taft Jordan's offering up his adoration to her. Jordan is very much in Louis Armstrong's succession, vocally and trumpet-wise.

There's beautiful singing by Ella on these sides, accompanied probably by the Webb band – or at least part of them - and with very sensitive and light piano by Tommy Fulford and one solo spot for tenor sax. That's a bit sparse for a jazz lover, yet pleasant listening. But 'A-Tisket, A-Tasket' has decidedly more punch than the Decca version.

And then it's Chick Webb on drums and trumpet star Roy Eldridge are featured playing 'Liza' (All The Clouds Roll Away)' on this air-check side, using the Webb band's arrangement of this title. The band probably/possibly is not the Chick Webb Orchestra, their personnel probably unknown, as yet. Chick Webb is un-sensitive and pounding here, and probably in tension, and thus in a hurry.

And again, a decidedly commercial recording session with three titles of rather amateurish origin, sung by Ella and accompanied by Chick's band, he himself very much retained. And only a few short solos spread over the titles.

'Who Ya Hunchin' being a Webb – Fitzgerald original, the band handle it with fire and drive, the drummer all over his drum-kit. He plays a four-bar break in a break-neck sixteenth-beat, only to drag heavily when falling in a one – three bass-drum rhythm with cymbal strokes on two – four at the very end of the title..

And although Ella had recorded two of her own titles at this session already – under her 'E. F. and her Savoy Eight', there still is a third title of hers, with the big band following the commercial 'singer plus accompaniment' formula.

When checking the composer credits of the tunes recorded here and at the following session, it looks like Chick Webb had discovered the opportunities to cash in on the royalties due to outside composers!

All discographies state the take-over of the lead-trumpet chair by young Dick Vance for this session. Dick Vance had been with Fletcher Henderson before, and he certainly was a suitable candidate for this position. He kept this chair for a couple of years. Mario Bauza obviously tended back to Latin music with the Machito Orchestra, after stints with Don Redman and Cab Calloway. I do not hear any changes in the first trumpet parts performed by Dick Vance here, his tone being a slight bit slimmer, perhaps, but perfectly swinging. 'F.D.R. Jones' presents Chick Webb beautifully playing press-rolls on his snare-drum, as well as much more to be studied of Webb's drumming on these sides. But still, this again is a collection of the 'vocal – band' formula with some silly childish songs, but played immaculately.

These titles were recorded by Victor for NBC Transcriptions and show the band in all their glory.

None of these titles - with two exceptions only - had been recorded before by Decca, and obviously show part of the band's jazz repertoire, whereas the Decca records brought the commercial stuff. But sorry to say, they did not record Ella here. A real pity! There is so much great music on these sides! Did anyone care in the past to preserve them on CD? I feel very lucky to own all these transcriptions and live recordings of the Chick Webb band listed on LP.

And these sides mediate a much better feature of the band as it would have been witnessed by the public in the Savoy Ballroom than on the Decca sides. Just listen!

Chick's lifelong pal John Trueheart is back on guitar after a long illness! But - it has to be added - he had a wonderful replacement for two years with Bobby Johnson, many years strong and reliable banjoist/guitarist of the Charlie Johnson band earlier on.

That's a session for slumber-time in front of the record player. It certainly is the tamest of this whole investigation. And compared with Chick's un-official air-checks as listed above and below, this - for me - is the lowest point of Chick Webb's career on record. One little point of joy: the 4-bar bridges in the first title, filled with sustained lip-trills of a trombonist, the player of which I cannot identify, but checked by tone this may be Matthews.

This is the final recording session of Chick Webb and his Orchestra, with their leader playing the drums. I feel sorry to state that here the Chick Webb band deliver their low point of jazz/swing recordings. There are four titles of medium to slow music by Ella's vocal cum big band, containing 49 bars of instrumental solo – that is 12 bars each of the four titles, and one bar left over. And only 'Little White Lies' encloses a couple of interesting chord changes inherent in its composition. A pity!
